NOTES FROM THE PASTOR:

So.....the snow.

The great winter of 2015. It's astonishing how quickly our lives can go from 60 miles an hour to standing stock still.

Leon and I live out in the country. Our driveway is over 900 feet long. Our tractor is diesel. We had a few days of being immobile. We were connected with the outside world, of course. Fortunately we never lost power, and were able to keep up with the predictions and go online (when we felt like it). We had food, and firewood to help bolster our electric heat. We were out daily, taking care of the farm animals and keeping their water supply fresh and making sure they had hay, because they were not able to reach the grass for the snow. We realized we were fortunate. But we were still cut off.

In the midst of this all, it occurred to me that there was a metaphor for life in all this. We could get out, but were hampered by nature. We spoke with folks in town, who were able to get out and about within a day or so. They didn't quite get that we couldn't get out – because THEY could. I would have to stop and remember that though WE couldn't get out, there were others who could and would check on the church building and members. A kind neighbor came and graded our driveway. The tractor unfroze. We were able to get to the end of the driveway. But the 6/10 of a mile of country road that separated us from a major road was almost impassable. So close, and yet so far.

You and I talk with folks every day; they sound okay and make the right noises. But they may feel as cut off from the rest of us as we were when we were snow-bound. We need to listen and be aware, you and I.

The snow is (so I'm told) going to melt. The winter will pass, and the time for the singing of birds will come back. It always does. That's what makes our part of the world so lovely. We have the ability to go through all 4 seasons (and in Kentucky, sometimes we can go through all 4 in a day!). We get to live the promise of Scripture, and of life: it gets dark and cold sometimes, but hang on: there's a glimmer of light. God promises.

Nominating Committee

Each year our church calls into order a Nominating Committee, comprised of 1 elder, 2 deacons, and 3 members at large. The function of this committee is to fill necessary positions within the church board – officers and deacons. (It also presents the name of any new elders which need to be nominated, but those are gathered within the elder board, and that does not happen each year.) This is done through a system of gathering names from within the congregation. Anyone who has been a church member for the 12 months prior to the new church year (which begins on 1 July) may be considered. Slips for suggesting possible names are available at each door of the sanctuary, and on this page. It is to be hoped that many of you will – with prayer and discernment – think about those around you who would be good additions to our working Board. Officers are also elected each year. The deacon co-chairs determine how many new deacons need to be added to the roster, which consists of a term of three years on, one year of sabbatical. It is the job of the Nominating Committee to count the names on the slips AND TO MAKE CONTACT WITH THOSE WHO ARE NOMINATED. The 2015-2016 Nominating Committee: Susan Thomas, chair; Carmen Swim, Holly Pollock, Jack Whidden, Mike Seelig, and Joyce Hart. Please be in prayer for them as they work and serve our larger church. NOMINATION SLIPS NEED TO BE TURNED IN BY MARCH 15th; a basket is available in front of the sanctuary chalice in which to place the slips, or you may drop them in the offering plate or mail them to the office.

Our Nominating Committee is working on the 2015-2018 rotation of deacons. They ask you to join them in prayer and discernment as this process unfolds. **Only church members may be nominated.** The slate will be presented to the board at the March meeting for approval; then the slate will be published in the ECHO and the bulletin so that the congregation may know the names. The slate will be voted on by the congregation at the May annual meeting.

3-Leaf Clover

In the 5th century when <u>St. Patrick</u> came to convert the Irish, information on Christianity could only be spread across the realm from one storyteller, or seanchaí, pronounced *shan-a-key* to the other.

In mind of this St. Patrick used the Shamrock to explain the concept of the holy trinity - that God was composed of three entities - the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit - yet each entity was part of the other just like the shamrock has three leaves but a single stem.



As St. Patrick continued to use the Shamrock in his conversion of the Irish, it grew through storytelling to be seen as a holy plant, just as he was seen as a holy man.
