CHALKING THE DOOR

January 6 is the twelfth night of Christmastide, the Feast of the Epiphany, sometimes called "Three Kings Day," and starts the Season of Epiphany, continuing until Ash Wednesday. In some cultures, January 6 is a large and festive end to the Christmas season: a day of presents, parades, and celebration. Epiphany is an invitation to follow stars, listen to dreams, and step out of what we have always known.

In the gospel of Matthew (Matthew 2:1-12) we find the story of the magi who arrived in Bethlehem guided by a star, bringing gifts. They have a small part in Matthew's gospel, and yet a robust tradition has grown around them overtime, including their number (three) and Epiphany at Home p2

When my son was growing up, his father was often away in January, leading study abroad classes through Europe. Ben and

I were left in dreary Washington state, dreaming of traveling to far away places. To make our time more special, I planned outings and activities. We frequented Starbucks for tasty treats. We'd make a special day trip to Seattle, to visit museums, shop in our favorite bookstores, eat at beloved restaurants.

I found ways to extend the Christmas season, relying heavily on the idea there are twelve days of Christmas, not just one. We began to celebrate Epiphany in our house, leaving our tree up and lit until January 6 and the magi of our nativity set took a long and circuitous route to the manger.

Often we would bake a King's cake for a special meal, and we took up the old tradition of Chalking the Door (see article on pp 1 & 2). I had read of the tradition of preparing the home for a visit by the Magi, leaving a bowl of water for their



camels and shoes next to the door for a surprise gift of candies and treats in return. So every January 5th we'd tell the story of the Magi, put out a big bowl of water by the front door, carefully place our shoes nearby—and miraculously, the next morning all the water would be gone and a few of our favorite treats would be stuffed into our shoes!

In those small ways we were learning to practice our faith at home, weaving the stories into our lives just a little bit more during the long winter. New Ways p2

their names (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar). Their sacred story invites us to reflect upon our own. Who or what is leading you to God? Which stars will you follow this year and what road will you take? What gifts will you offer?

On Epiphany, consider participating in an ancient tradition known as "Chalking the Door." This practice consists of marking a blessing in chalk in a specific pattern of letters and numbers, to invite God's blessing on a home, church, or other entryway, and on all who enter its doors during the year. All you need is chalk and a doorway. The markings are usually made above the front door or main entrance, in this pattern:

$$20 + C + M + B + 21$$

Here's a sample liturgy adapted from www.beliefnet.com. Each person may take a turn reading the part of the Leader.

Leader: Peace be to this house and all who enter here.

Leader: A reading from Proverbs: "By wisdom a house is built, and through understanding it is established; through knowledge its rooms are filled with rare and beautiful treasures."

Leader: Let us pray: Gracious God, as a shining star once guided the magi to the birthplace of the infant Jesus, so enable those who dwell here to be your light in the world; through Jesus Christ we pray. **Amen.**

Using chalk, inscribe the frame above the door with the inscription shown below. The letters C M B come from the traditional (9th century) names for the "three kings"--Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. Some also suggest "Christus Mansionem Benedicat," which means "May Christ bless this dwelling." The numbers stand for the year 2021. Each person receives a turn to make one or more of the marks: 20 + C + M + B + 21.

Leader: A reading from Isaiah: "The effect of righteousness is peace, and the result of righteousness, quietness and trust forever. My people will abide in a peaceful habitation, in secure dwellings, and quiet places."

Leader: Let us pray: Sovereign God, we pray that you will bless this home and all who live here with your gracious presence, that your love may be our inspiration, your wisdom our guide, your truth our light, and your peace our benediction; through Jesus Christ we pray. **Amen.**

wreaths at home, practiced prayer while coloring, and we've even sung along with others while our mics were muted! And as a congregation we have adapted our traditions




so that we could continue to give generously to our neighbors, sharing gifts with families needing help this year.

A Message from the Creation Care Team

Kentucky author and conservationist Wendell Berry wrote: "The primary motive for good care and good use (of creation) is always going to be affection, because affection involves us entirely...."

Each month the Creation Care Team will offer suggestions about involving us entirely in developing our affection for the Earth. This month we have two suggestions:

1. Count the number of single-use plastic items you use this week. Conduct a waste audit in your home and at work to determine which products are made from plastic. From there, identify what you might be able to swap for more durable, reusable alternatives. According to the Earth Policy Institute, each year, 17 million barrels of crude oil are extracted to manufacture the plastic water bottles used in the U.S. alone. In addition to fossil fuel consumption, creating plastic bottles can take twice as much water than just refilling a reusable bottle. (From REI Stewardship campaign)

2. Opportunities for Hikes& Promote Creation Care

New Year's Day Hikes (3)

The Sheltowee Trace Association and the local chapter are offering several options for New Year's Day hikes. You can see all the options and sign up at this link. (link info below) All hikes are free of charge and will start at 9am. As noted in the descriptions, we will be observing COVID-19 precautions, including social distancing and mask-wearing when gathered in a group.

All starting from the same location, Rodburn Hollow Park in Morehead.

Option 1 - walk an easy 1-mile loop located entirely in the park, to enjoy the outdoors and the company of fellow hikers.

Option 2 - hike up the ridge from the park to the Sheltowee Trace. We will turn around at a viewpoint on the Trace and hike back to the park. About 3.5-4 miles total.

Option 3 - hike up the ridge to the Sheltowee and then take the Sheltowee all the way back to Morehead State University at Eagle Lake and the Recreation and Wellness Center. About 6.5 miles. Hikers who take this option will need to arrange their own rides home or back to their cars at Rodburn Park.

Weather decisions (go or no go) will be made no later than 6 hours before a hike is to begin. Please lock your car, take your keys, leave nothing in the open. Carry some water, a snack. FCC OUTREACH MAKING A DIFFERENCE THIS HOLIDAY SEASON

We are wrapping up the busiest time of the year for our Outreach Committee. With the help of our youth and your donations, we provided 10 Thanksgiving Baskets to families in our area. Paul Semisch and the folks at Gateway Homeless Coalition expressed their deepest gratitude for the baskets and were excited to get them delivered to families in need.

Our Christmas Project was a huge success, thanks to donations from our congregation and friends of FCC! We raised \$6,810 for Thanksgiving and Christmas. Through discounts from local businesses and holiday sales online, we were able to purchase coats/jackets, shoes, pajamas, pants, tops, socks, underwear, gloves, and hats for 40 Rowan County children, as well as hygiene and household supplies for the 11 families. All of these children received toys/gifts from individual members of our congregation, and we were able to provide them with a huge box of food, also purchased by individuals from our congregation and friends of FCC. We expected our expenses to be greater than in the past because we were shopping for 8 additional children this year; however, we were able to come in under \$5,000. The Outreach

Committee met digitally, and we determined that the surplus in donations would best be used to purchase Kroger gift cards for each of the 11 families. Food insecurity is a huge need at this time, as you may have heard in the news, and we discussed how difficult it may be for these families to provide food in the month after Christmas. Because our congregation and friends were so generous this year and needs are so great *this year*, we voted, overwhelmingly, to extend our help to these 11 families with gift cards to purchase food. Each of our 6 large families received a \$150.00 Kroger card, and the 5 smaller families each were given a \$100 Kroger card. This leaves us a balance of approximately \$472 to be applied to next year's Christmas or used in the coming months as needs arise in our community.

We communicated directly with each family on behalf of the church, and each one expressed overwhelming gratitude. I would like to share with you just a few of their sentiments:

~One mother said, "If it hadn't been for all of your help, I don't know what we would have done this Christmas!" ~A grandmother, who is raising three grandchildren, and has been waiting on a check since April, asked me to pass on her blessings and gratitude to everyone who donated. "God bless you ALL," she said. ~A mother of a very large family said she did not expect so much, and was truly thankful for all our help. ~One gentleman, who is raising his two grandchildren, was nearly moved to tears as he told us that he had never accepted help before, and he wasn't used to this, but he was "SO thankful for it" this year. ~Another parent/grandparent said, "Everything you all did saved us this Christmas!"

We believe your help and donations through our church's Outreach *truly* made a difference in the lives of these 11 families this Christmas! Thank you so much, once again, to everyone who donated, purchased items, wrapped gifts, delivered gifts, and helped in any way. This was definitely a "whole group" effort, and your generosity of time and resources made it a huge success!

In addition to the 11 Rowan County families we helped, we also provided food baskets, household items, hygiene items, blankets and gloves to 10 elderly couples in our area. Many of these elderly folks are struggling with food insecurity, and do not have anyone who can help them get what they need. Our friends who deliver these items for us shared that last year, one of the elderly gentlemen said to his wife, upon receiving our donations, "Now we have something to eat." The needs are great in our area and in our community, and your continued support of FCC Outreach makes it possible for us to assist those who need it most.

We will resume our basket donations to the Gateway Homeless Coalition beginning in February. These baskets provide items for families who are transitioning from homelessness to living in their own place. These "starter" baskets include such items as dishes, silverware, cookware, bedding, linens, etc. We provide one basket each month from February through October. If you are interested in signing up to assist with this project, a Sign-up Genius will be set up early in January, and we will send out a link for that in the weekly eBlast/Staying in Touch emails.

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Star Words for Epiphany

RETHINKING A TRADITION

It is a prayer practice in churches all over the world to give people a star word on this Epiphany Sunday. There are many reasons behind this tradition.

First, we know that the Magi followed a star, which ultimately led them to Jesus. Therefore, we too use all the resources we have available to us—including creative prayer practices and intention words for



the new year—to move closer to Jesus. Secondly, we trust that God uses multiple ways to guide us and speak to us.

Star words are one such lens that might provide us with a way to look for God in our midst, both actively and in hindsight. Finally, we know that the most common prayer practice for many involves speaking to God as opposed to silence or contemplation. However, this prayer practice invites a new prayer rhythm of reflection and review that can be a powerful new way to connect with God.

If we were gathering in person, we would have the opportunity to pick out a star word for ourselves. This year we have numbered our star words from 1 to 150. If you would like a star word this year, choose a number between 1 and 150 and contact the church office or message us on Facebook with your chosen number. We'll give you the word you've chosen. Printed star words

will be available for pick up or mailing after January 3.


Holy One,
